Hasina's STORY



"Working for Friends of Refugees is my first job in America. It was a big challenge, since the work with Embrace Refugee Birth is very different from what I studied in Kabul. Luckily, I am a fast learner."

Hasina Ajeer has a Master's Degree in Business Administration. For ten years, she had worked in Finance and Management at various universities. Then, the US's exit from Afghanistan threw her world into chaos. She arrived in the US in December of 2021.

By June of the following year, she was serving as a Program Impact Associate and Afghan Community Liaison. "She jumped right in," says Virginia Tester, Director of Embrace. "Within a month, she was helping to teach classes and host baby showers for refugee women at the newly renovated Hospitality House. She even figured out a new way of accessing transportation for women without cars."

"We all help each other and teach each other on the team," laughs Hasina. "I taught them about transportation, Aku taught me about postpartum. Mu Naw taught me about accessing family services. We are all just working together to help these women, and sharing our culture along the way," she says.

Forming new friendships has been key to her sense of community in the US. She explains, "I have many friends, including two American women. We have coffee, we share food. When I feel tired and lonely, they encourage me."

Pattie Baker



"I am not a gardener.

I am a person working on resilience."

Pattie Baker is a second generation American and one of the many friends who gave their time to help New Americans flourish last year.

She came to the Jolly Avenue Garden with the simple desire to be a friend to fellow gardeners. For Pattie, this meant creating "revival gardens," or enriching garden plots to make them more fertile. A productive plot means more food for a family!

Over the course of eighteen months, Pattie was dedicated to creating revival gardens in our Clarkston community.

"The generosity and hospitality of the other gardeners has deeply inspired me," she says.

SOUTHFACE


Energy experts at the Southface Institute, with a grant from their GoodUse program, helped us renovate our Hospitality House and other spaces, drastically lowering our utility bills.
